What is Urbanization?

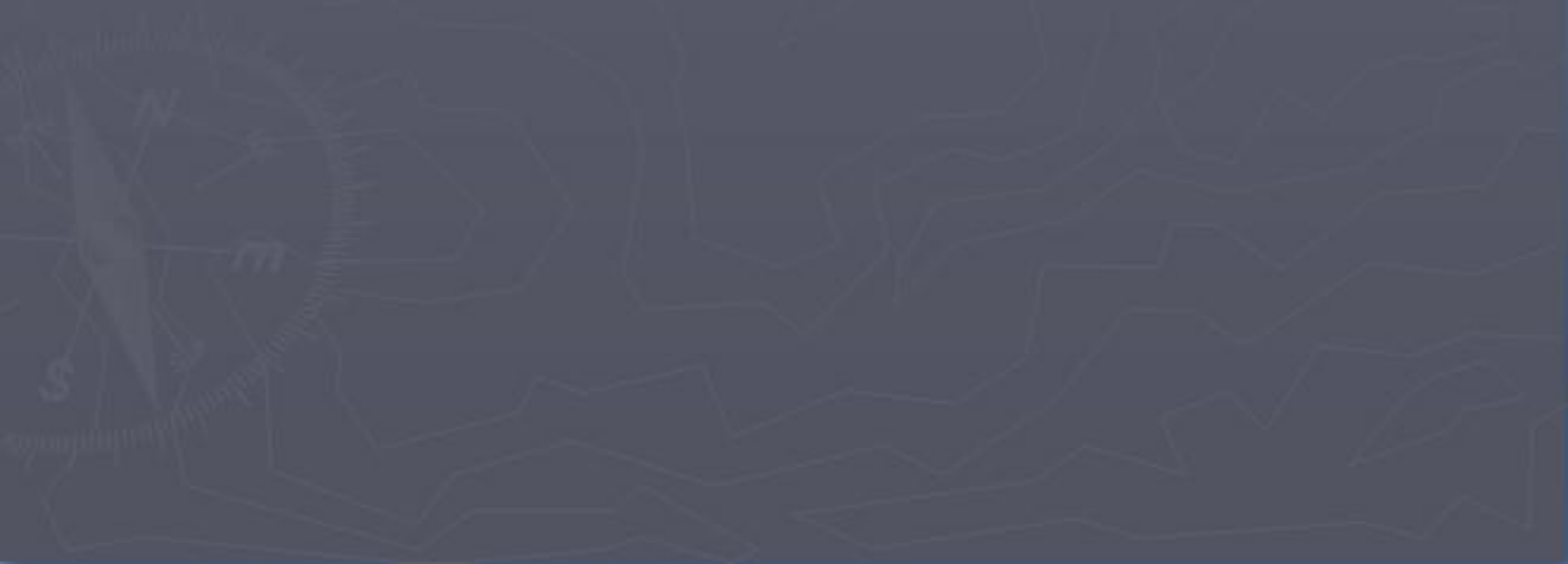
- Urbanization is referred to as the migration of people in large numbers from rural to urban areas.
- Urbanization occurs mainly because of the concentration of resources and facilities in towns and cities.



What is Urbanization?

- The world's cities are growing because people are moving from rural areas in search of jobs, opportunities to improve their lives and create a better future for their children.

Attractions to Urban Areas



Urban Pull Factors

- **The availability of jobs**
- Proper infrastructure – roads, water, electricity etc.
- Availability of social services – health, education, recreation, postal services and police stations.
- A wide variety of entertainment and night life facilities

Rural Push Factors

- Scarcity of jobs except in agriculture, and most people consider agricultural occupations to be low-paying, laborious, risky and menial.
- Lack of infrastructure such as poor roads, irregular water and electricity supplies.
- Poor facilities in education, health and security
- Lack of entertainment and recreational facilities.

Problems of Urbanization

- Pressure on resources and social services
 - eg. water, transport, health and education.



Problems of Urbanization

- More Unemployment



Problems of Urbanization

- Increased crime rate, especially since the typical migrant may be young, unskilled or inexperienced.



Problems of Urbanization

- Development of slums (ghettos) due to inadequate housing. This will add to the problem of pollution.

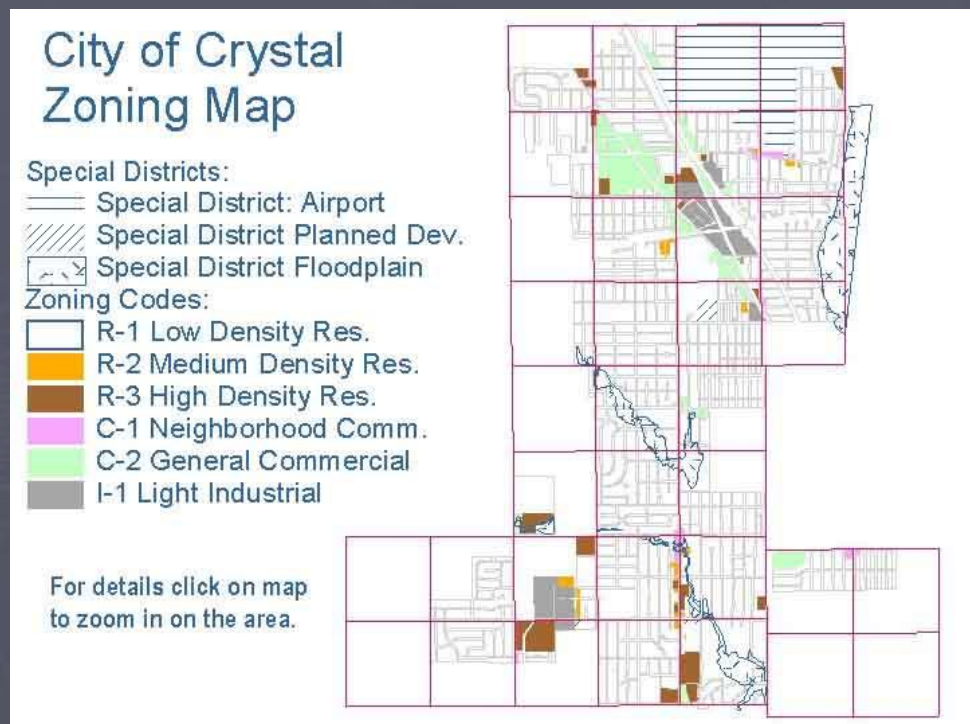
Solving Urbanization

- Put a stop to using agricultural lands for non-agricultural purposes such as housing.



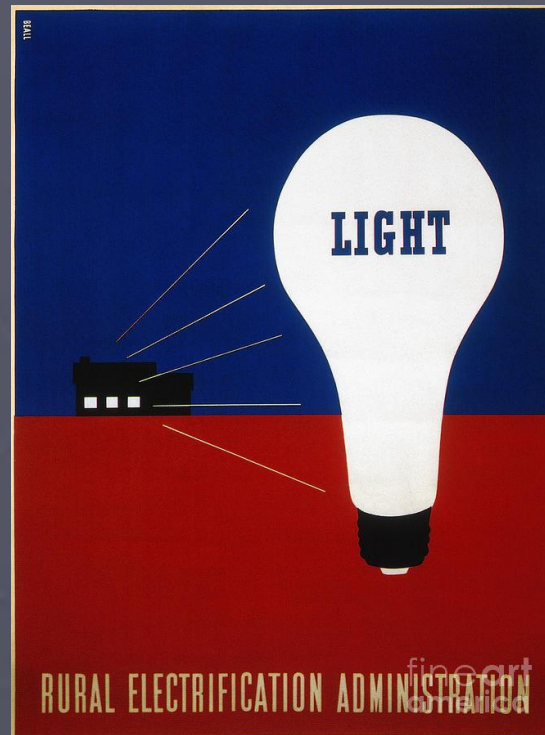
Solving Urbanization

- Develop the rural areas by providing recreation, education, health care and other social services.

- Develop basic infrastructure in the rural areas
– eg. roads, water and electricity.
