

# Coins

- Inscriptions with the value
- Different shapes
  - Spade, knife, circular
- Bronze or gold inlays
- Changes in coinage reflected changes in government
  - Valuation of metals



## Sculptures

- Chinese sculptors sought to capture the "life spirit" of the human subject
  - Concentrating on facial expression and a posture that suggests movement

#### Ceramics

- Brightly colored and highly stylized
  - Used natural and celestial themes
    - Including mythological animals
- Used for functional purposes primarily
  - Hu
    - Funerary containers

### **Funerary Statues and Artifacts**

- Buried with the dead
  - To allow for decoration and entertainment for the person in the afterlife
  - Significance
    - Displayed common activities, architecture, fashion, etc...
