- May maintain subsidiaries in other countries


Rely on complex international agreements and interstate cooperation to maintain ability to do business


Distribution of resources for Lithium-Ion Batteries



#### New International Division of Labor

To minimize costs and maximize profits companies will locate production facilities in countries with lower minimum wages and benefits and ship parts or final product to market

#### What this means for the Countries

LDCs become dependent upon MDCs for their economies, often times sacrificing economic development or democratization in favor of preserving investment by foreign corporations.

Example: Banana Republics

MDCs become dependent upon LDCs for the supply of low-cost goods and raw materials, that would otherwise be too expensive to produce in native industries

Example: iPhone production at Foxconn

#### What this means for the Environment

Countries end up sacrificing their own environmental health in favor of maintaining close ties with foreign corporations who may care little about long-term effects.

- Can always move on to a new location when environmental regulations become too strict
- Should be in company's best interest to preserve means of production



Changing Business Climate: Public Shaming Case Study - VW

In 2015 VW had been found to be using devices to cheat on emissions testing in the US

 Resulting in shakedown at VW, Indictments for top executives, over \$10 billion in fines, and international shaming
