

The Rule of William the Conqueror

- Introduced Feudal System to England
 - granted large **fiefs** to lords
 - Fief land given to control in exchange for service








The Domesday Book

- In 1086 William ordered a complete Census of the Kingdom
 - Used it as a way of figuring out a tax collection system












 Why do you think they would compare this tax book to the end of the world?














 Why would a tax book be so important for regional control?









Rule of Henry II (1133-1189)

- Established system of Royal Justice
 - Common Law foundation for English Legal System
- Established system of Royal Courts
 - Increased Royal Control of matters of law
- Introduced Jury system to England












 Why would putting control of the court system in the hands of the king be so important for regional stability? Why could it create instability?









Rule of King John (1199 – 1216)

- Loss to the French
 - Lost regions of Anjou and Normandy
- Loss to the Pope
 - Disagreement led to excommunication of John
 - England made a fief of the Papacy
- Loss to the Nobles
 - Forced to sign Magna Carta
