


Romanesque Origins


- Primarily attached to the rise and spread of Christianity in Europe
 - Monasteries became centers of education and art
 - Construction of city cathedral and churches in Roman Style
 - Trying to bring people closer to God

Romanesque Architecture

- Primarily monasteries, cathedrals, and churches
- Adapted from plans of the Roman Basilica
 - Nave
 - Lateral aisles
 - Apse
 - Ambulatory
 - Side Chapels


The Nave – York Cathedral, York, England


Ornamentation and Design

Master of Pedret, Apse fresco from Tredòs, Val d'Aran, Catalonia, c. 1100


